
### The Lolo Trail Work Week-2017

The 2017 Lolo Work Week, a highlight of Idaho Chapter summer activities since 2009, was again a success. Nineteen workers, only two of whom were new, camped in tents (mostly) at NoSeeUm Meadows near Sherman Peak, thought to be the place where in 1805 the Corps of Discovery's spirits were revived when they saw plains to the west. For five days our spirits were high as we worked on trails and signs so that other forest visitors could better understand and experience the terrain and the history.

Financial support for 2017 came from the Idaho Governor's Bicentennial Commission, the United States Forest Service, and a bequest from the estate of John W. Sproat Jr., a Lewis and Clark enthusiast from Ohio.

Most of us worked in crews of three to five to clear 31 miles of the Lewis and Clark Trail and side trails, replacing location signs, cutting brush, and removing dozens of trees that had fallen across the path since last year. While working there was time to see, hear and smell the forest, to behold the vistas, and to contemplate the marvelous journey of the Corps of Discovery. We were assisted on Tuesday and Wednesday by Adam, a Trails Supervisor from the Forest Service. Our crews located and reported large logs across the trails and Adam removed them with his chainsaw (which





did! Two Forest Service administrators visited during the week as well. A few workers spent three days renovating seven large interpretive signs erected for the Lewis and Clark bicentennial in 2004-2006: Indian Post Office, Howard Camp, Saddle Camp (3 signs), The Smoking Place, and Greensward Camp. Harsh winters had damaged the frames from which the signs hung, and the Greensward Camp sign had disappeared. Vital to the job, during those three days Dick Monaghan drove his backhoe over

the rocky and rutted Lolo Motorway for 20 miles – at about four miles per hour.





Our weather was exceptional: this year it didn't rain! In previous years we experience thunderstorms and hail. All told we spent just under 600 hours making the trails more usable and the signs more likely to be seen.

We worked hard during the day, rising at 6:00 for a scrumptious breakfast then heading for work assignments by about 7:30. Teams were generally back to camp by late afternoon and folks were able to rest and take care of personal things before a filling supper. After supper we were treated to music and recitations, and were off to bed by 8:30 or 9:00 to be ready for the next day. Some time was available for other activities. Kris Townsend, accompanied by others, was able to



spend some time researching potential paths that the Corps of Discovery followed on their westward journey. And several members took time on Friday to pick huckleberries that were just ripening.



It was a pleasure to have so many skilled, willing people contributing to keeping the trails open and the signs repaired. We expect to do a Work Week in 2018, and invite you to join us. More information should be available in the spring.

## New Partnership Benefits Lewis and Clark Trail in Idaho

(Salmon, ID) The Lewis and Clark National Historic Trail in Idaho will financially benefit from an agreement recently signed between the Idaho Governor's Lewis and Clark Trail Committee (IGLCTC) and the Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation (LCTHF).

Both the IGLCTC and the LCTHF are charged with administering separate grant programs devoted to the Lewis and Clark Trail. The IGLCTC administers grant funds mostly generated by the sale of Idaho's Sacajawea vehicle license

plates. The LCTHF, a national organization based in Great Falls, Montana, allocates grant funds from interest generated by their Bicentennial Trail Stewardship grant program which was created during the Lewis and Clark Bicentennial a decade ago.

Bob Russell, Chair of IGLCTC said "This Memorandum of Understanding provides the framework for our two organizations to jointly fund trail stewardship projects along the length of the Lewis and Clark Trail in Idaho". President of the LCTHF Philippa Newfield added "It is essential that organizations such as ours coordinate on trail stewardship projects in order to bring significant financial resources to important work along the trail. LCTHF has similar agreements with the National Park Service, Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management. When these partners all work together we can bring significant resources and expertise to needed trail work!"

The agreement was signed by Ms. Newfield and Mr. Russell on July 25<sup>th</sup> at the LCTHF Annual Meeting held this year in Billings, MT.
