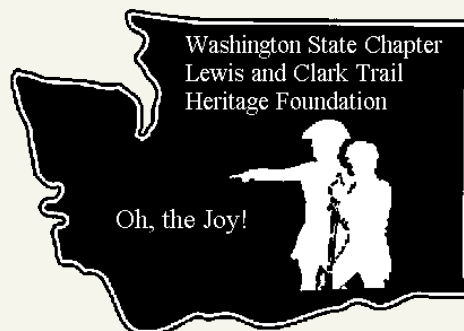

HERITAGE DAYS SACAJAWEA STATE PARK, SEPT 25-26

Sacajawea State Park - named for the young Agaidika Shoshone woman who made the arduous journey from the Great Plains to the Pacific with the Corps of Discovery - will again host the annual Heritage Days event on September 25 -26, 2015. The park is located at the point of the confluence of the Columbia and Snake rivers, where the expedition led by Lewis and Clark finally reached the long-sought "great river of the West."

Heritage Days will feature a Corps of Discovery living history encampment, cultural displays from local tribes, mountain man camps, and exhibits from local museums. Visitors to the event will learn about the lives and skills of early American explorers, the Native American cultures they encountered, and the lives of the early settlers - as they interact with history interpreters who enjoy sharing their skills and knowledge about what life was like two centuries ago.

Sacajawea Interpretive Center features the story of Sacajawea, the journeys of Lewis & Clark, and the history of the Native Americans they encountered. The Jay Perry Room of Indian Artifacts contains outstanding stone and bone tools from the Columbia Basin Plateau; they date in age from 200 to 12,000 years. The center is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily; admission to the center is free (State Park Fees apply), but donations are welcomed.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

It has been an eventful year so far for events and activities related to Lewis and Clark.

The year began with a new living history event in Long Beach, WA on the Martin Luther King holiday weekend. "Wintering the Pacific" was a three-day program featuring the Pacific Northwest Living Historians. It is possible that Long Beach may host two living history events in 2016. This is great news; one of the very best ways to share the story of the expedition is when the public has the chance to "meet the Corps."

In February, our annual Chapter meeting in Tacoma, WA was highlighted by a presentation by Doc Wesselius about the horses and saddles used by the Corps of Discovery. I believe that Doc's research and knowledge regarding this subject is unmatched.

We shared the company of our friends in the Oregon Chapter in April for a Spring Field Trip in the Columbia Gorge. After a tour of the outstanding Western Antique Aeroplane and Auto-mobile Museum in Hood River, OR and a meeting of the Chapter Board of Directors, we explored expedition campsite locations on the Washington shoreline. We also gazed across the river to view the location near Mosier OR which Roger Wendlick believes to be the "good situation" option considered as a site for winter quarters by the Captains.

Late May brought the dedication of the Confluence Project Listening Circle at Chief Timothy Park. The following day featured a visit to the WSU Press in Pullman, WA. Our host was Bob Clark, editor of *We Proceeded On*, who showed us the state-of-the-art printing equipment used to publish WPO.

Washington State Parks reopened Lyons Ferry State Park in June. The Grand-Reopening festivities included a Native blessing and presentations about the history of the site, including the Corps of Discovery camp at the mouth of "Drewyer's (now Palouse) River" in October 1805. But certainly the loudest part of the program was when Gary Lentz, in full dress uniform as Sgt. Patrick Gass, fired a salute with a replica 1803 Harpers Ferry rifle.

If you missed any of these events, don't fret - we look forward to more L&C activities in 2015.

Heritage Days, featuring Lewis and Clark living history along with Native American presentations and mountain man camps, is scheduled for Sept. 25th & 26th at Sacajawea State Park, at the confluence of the Snake and Columbia Rivers near Pasco, WA. The Washington State Chapter will hold its final Field Trip and Board meeting of the year in Ilwaco, WA on Nov. 6, 7 & 8; also, the Oregon Chapter's annual pot-luck dinner will be held in Camas, OR on Dec. 5th.

I hope to see you at one of these upcoming events!

FREE PARKS PASS TO ALL 4TH GRADERS

The Federal government is giving annual passes to all 4th graders and their families. These passes are valued at \$80.00 each. This program is called, 'Every Kid in a Park'. If you know a 4th grader and would like to get a free pass, go to <http://www.everykidinapark.gov> and have your 4th grader answer a few questions about outdoor adventures. After that you'll get a electronic pass that you can print and use. Heritage Days runs for two days, Friday and Saturday. Friday's programs, from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m., will focus primarily on providing interactive displays for the local schools; Friday visitors will be required to display the annual Washington Discover Pass, or to buy a \$10 vehicle access pass.

On Saturday, Heritage Days will be **free** for the all visitors since Sept. 26th is National Public Lands Day, and the event hours are from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

On Saturday night there is a Campfire Program. The people who are encamped at the park join with visitors around the bonfire to play music, sing, tell stories, and just have a good time. The campfire program starts at around 7:30 PM and is open to the public.

Sacajawea State Park is a 284-acre marine, day-use park located in Pasco, Washington, where the Snake River merges with the Columbia. The park is located on a plain of the great Lake Missoula floods which swept through the area 12,000 years ago. It features 9,100 feet of freshwater shore-line with the park's lands being sand dunes interspersed with wetland ponds. The property was deeded to Washington State Parks in 1931. Contact the park for more information about this event.
